Just as in ancient times when humans painted murals in caves with prayers and wishes, I have immersed myself in my work in the light of the sun and moon, feeling the wind and the sound of light outside day and night.

With the desire to express something that transcends human reason, I create my works by reconstructing that time and space, utilizing the momentum, delicacy, and coincidence of water.

The Internet, digital devices, modern knowledge and common sense, the world situation...

I am currently working on the "Remembered Records" series, in which I feel such various information and reflect it in my paintings through the filter of myself.

There is something that we, living in the modern world, have forgotten.

I would like to create something that appeals to the spirit, questioning the roots of humanity, even though such memories are vague.

A drop of water that leads to an ocean of art that spreads to the world.

I sincerely hope that my work will have such a meaning in Fukuoka, the city where I was born and raised.

2.As the Brush Moves
